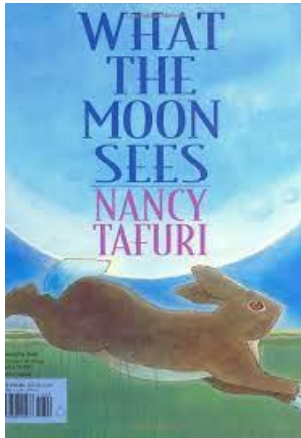


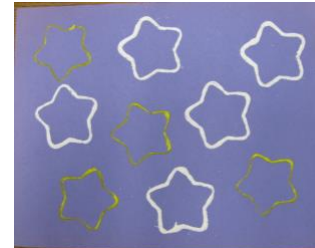

Star Printing

Place a small amount of yellow or white paint on a paper plate. Dip a star shaped cookie cutter onto the paint and then onto a piece of black or dark blue construction paper. (The wide side of the cutter works best).

If you don't have tempera paint, try using shaving cream mixed with equal amounts of glue for a puffy effect. (This will take longer to dry).



Hidden Stars

Help your child draw stars on a piece of white paper with a white crayon.

Using blue or black watercolors, paint over the white crayon stars to make them magically appear.

Decorate a crescent moon

Cut out a crescent shape out of a paper plate or other lightweight cardboard. Completely cover your moon with aluminum foil, or leave it white. Decorate your moon with white, yellow or silver buttons. Hang it in your child's room and at night turn off all the lights and shine a flashlight on it.



Moon Puppet

Help your child draw a crescent moon on a paper plate. Color it in and draw or glue on eye(s). Talk about what the moon sees.

Remind your child of what the moon saw in the story.
